Did you know?

The Defense Travel System, often referred to as the "Devils Travel System," is quite easy to use if you travel often. However, if you do not, it can be difficult to navigate.

Did you know there are tools available on the DTS Travel Training and Resource Center that could be of use to you? By going to the DTS website at: www.defensetravel.dod.mil/site/training.cfm#lookup, and accessing the "Training Resource Lookup Tool," you will have access to multiple tri-fold pamphlets that will assist you in everything from creating authorizations and vouchers, to aiding Approving Officials in approving orders/vouchers. You can quickly access these tri-folds by entering the following data "Training Resource Lookup Tool" drop down menus:

Type: Reference Material
Sub-Type: Tri-Fold
Role: Traveler
 Hit the **submit** button.

These are great reference tools to keep handy while operating DTS.

Additionally, there are some common errors that travelers make in DTS, here are a few you can avoid:

1. Generating duplicate expenses such as rental car, CTO fees, and lodging. DTS inputs these for you when you book your airfare/rental car through the CTO, while lodging is under the per-

diem entitlements screen so you do not need to list it separately under the expenses tab.

2. Adjudicate pre-audit screens. Any flags you have under the pre-audit screen must have a justification. If you do not enter a justification, DTS goes into a loop sequence and will not allow you to sign your document. Make sure you justify any audited items in your document.
3. Separate lodging taxes. Make sure you breakout your lodging taxes as they are a separate reimbursable item.
4. Be aware the ATM service fee charged by Citi Bank is going up from 2% to 2.22% starting June 23. This fee is an authorized expense on your voucher when you are on official travel.

Within the next year, the Defense Travel Management Office will be updating and implementing a travel policy compliance program. The program will include an application that identifies errors in DTS travel documents and automatically notify travelers and administrators so corrective action can be taken. This will be very helpful for you, the traveler, and for our reviewing/approving officials.

Hopefully this information will be helpful for you as we continue to grow and transition to DTS. As always, your finance office stands ready to assist you.

ASTS bids farewell to 908th icon

The 908th Aeromedical Staging Squadron will soon bid farewell to one of its iconic members. Col. Camille Phillips will retire from the Air Force Reserve on Aug. 4, after serving as the commander for over three years.

Phillips joined the Air Force in 1982 and served on active duty for six years before coming to the 908th. Most people join active duty to travel the world, but Montgomery-native Phillips got assigned to Maxwell AFB as a dental officer.

"I've travelled more with the Reserves than I ever did with Active Duty," said Phillips. "I've had the opportunity to do things all over the world."

For the majority of her Reserve career, Phillips has been assigned to the 908th ASTS. In 2005, Phillips left the 908th to pursue a command position with the 514th Aerospace Medicine Squadron at McGuire AFB, N.J.

"I think it's better that I left for a while before taking a command position here," said Phillips, "because it gave me some outside experience."

Phillips said she is grateful to Col. Brett Clark, Commander of the 908th Airlift Wing, for allowing her the opportunity to return to the 908th.

"I commuted to McGuire for three and a half years," said Phillips. "When this opportunity arose, I was quick to put in my application to come back home."

Senior Master Sgt. Kenneth Wright said he has worked with Phillips for at least 20 years and

was excited when she came back to ASTS.

"She's one of the officers whose actions earned my respect," said Wright. "She will do anything she can, within regulations, to be sure the right thing is done for the unit and the member."

And her team-leadership abilities are visible throughout the ASTS work area. Hanging on the walls in the hallways are numerous paintings by Phillips and other ASTS members from a team-building exercise she facilitated to boost morale.

"We all went out to Corks and Canvas and had a glass of wine and painted together," said Phillips.

Phillips is also a civilian dentist here in Montgomery.

"All of our wing commanders have been patients of mine," said Phillips. "Make sure they know I'm not retiring from my private practice."

Wright said Phillips carries with her a lot of experience and history.

"I am doubly sad to see her go," said Wright. "She is a phenomenal commander and an excellent leader. I cannot overstate that. The Air Force is losing a phenomenal resource."

Although she will continue her civilian career, Phillips said she does plan to spend more time at the beach after she retires from the Reserve. Phillips's parting message to ASTS is to keep their current momentum.

"Keep learning and keep improving. Be life-long learners," said Phillips.

908th Maintenance Group is losing their commander to the halls of the Pentagon. Group commander Col. MacCauley von Hoffman has also been their leader, advisor and inspirational mentor.

"Our maintenance group thrived under her leadership," said Col. Brett Clark, 908th Airlift Wing commander. "Colonel Cauley von Hoffman is a one-of-a-kind officer who exemplified the highest standard of excellence every day. As she leaves, the MXG is again 'exporting excellence.' We will miss her and wish her all the best in her future in Washington D.C."

Von Hoffman, a Columbus, Miss., native, has come far since first arriving at the 908th in 2003 with her children and her husband, a pilot in the 187th Fighter Wing. She learned the first week she was here she would be commanding the 908th Maintenance Squadron and be the first maintenance officer in line for the pending deployment.

"I have had a wonderful support network, which is part of the reserve triad," she said. "You have to build a support network for the family that can help during (unit training assemblies) or deployments. I have a tremendous support network of family and friends that can do that."

Von Hoffman also gives credit for her success to her chiefs.

"My success is because of the success of the unit," said von Hoffman, "I listen to my chiefs a lot. I can't let up because they never let up."

The stamp of difference she hopes to have made during her time here were long-term improvements she implemented.

"We have spent an incredible amount of time and effort improving the maintenance facilities making

them representative of the quality work done here," said von Hoffman.

While deployed as maintenance officer for a CORONET OAK deployment, she experienced the loss of a technical sergeant in Puerto Rico. It had a huge impact on her, who said it was a pointed reminder of how important each Airman in the wing is.

"There was no warning order and no plan to follow," she said, "but from the first sergeant's notification of what had happened to presenting the posthumous award, this wing's performance was magnificent."

The action of maintenance group members cemented her convictions.

"Our unit is a family," said von Hoffman. "I would do everything in my power to be a positive influence on that family."

Master Sgt. Todd Kern, 908th Maintenance Squadron, echoed the sentiments of other Airmen.

"Rarely do you find the combination of qualities Colonel von Hoffman exudes," said Kern, "competence, compassion, trust in fellow professionals, and the courage to make tough decisions."

Von Hoffman said she is exceptionally proud of the MXG's performance during the Operational Readiness Inspection, the 2010 deployment and the LCAP.

Von Hoffman will be assigned as the assistant director of strategic logistics working for the chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff. She wants wing members to continue working to keep this wing an outstanding unit.

"The 908 AW gets closer to meeting our vision every day – 'an elite unit where each member considers it a privilege to belong,'" said von Hoffman. "So keep doing what you're doing!"

INSPECTION REFLECTION

More than 50 members of the 908th Airlift Wing were recognized as Outstanding Performers as the unit successfully completed a Combined Unit Inspection June 20-26. The inspection, conducted by the Air Force Reserve Command Inspector General's office, evaluated the unit's compliance with the financial, legal and programmatic Air Force Reserve

instructions and regulations.

Lt. Col. Troy Vonada, 908th Airlift Wing's Performance Planner, said this was the first time the wing has undergone a Combined Unit Inspection bringing together a Compliance Inspection, Logistics Compliance Assessment Program, and Health Service Inspection into one event. He said it was a tough inspection reviewing more than 4,000 items across the unit. Vonada explained the

goal of the CUI is to create "white space" where units have predictable four-year cycles with two years between compliance and Operational Readiness Inspections and deployments.

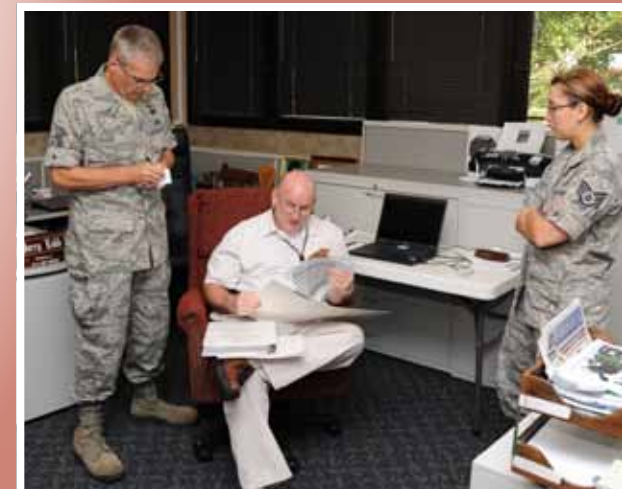
A team of subject matter experts from Headquarters AFRC, Robins Air Force Base, Ga., conducted the inspections.

The 908th received an overall Satisfactory rating on the CI, and an Excellent on the LCAP.

The 908th Aeromedical Staging Squadron received a Satisfactory in the HSI.

Following the inspection Brig. Gen. John J. Mooney III, AFRC/IG, praised the wing, stating the 908th had more outstanding performers identified by his team than any wing in recent memory.

"You were clearly prepared and your morale, etc., show that this is truly a quality organization," said Mooney.

Col. "Thanks for stepping up with the programs, the priorities and the strategic requirements as a wing commander I ask this wing to take on," said Clark, who relayed that both the 908th members and their families appreciated their hard work. His time with the groups was well received.
