Customs & Courtesies

The 908th Airlift Wing just had the honor of hosting the 22nd AF Commander and Command Chief. The visit went very well and was a great reminder in exercising proper customs and courtesies.

Customs and Courtesies (AFI 34-1201) are honored traditions that promote positive morale, good order, discipline and respect for chain of command. These time-honored traditions include saluting higher ranking officers, paying respect to the flag and the Air Force Song and displaying proper behavior in and out of uniform.

Saluting is a courteous greeting. When saluting, the junior member always salutes the senior member first. The salute should be initiated with enough time to allow the senior officer to return it. There are times when saluting may not be possible, in this case, a verbal greeting or head nod may suffice. When indoors and a higher ranking officer enters a room, the first person to see him or her should call the room to attention, unless someone has already been assigned to do so.

Rendering courtesies also applies to the U.S. Flag, National Anthem, Pledge of Allegiance, Air Force Song and other services. All military personnel in uniform outside must face the flag and salute during the raising and lowering of the flag. Also, when the first note of the national anthem or "To the Colors" is played, all personnel in uniform should stand, face the flag and salute. The salute must be held until the last note of music is played. When driving, all vehicles should come to a stop while all passengers sit quietly until the music ends. While in civilian clothes, military members should stand at attention, face the flag, and place

the right hand over the heart.

Other than saluting and rendering courtesies to the U.S. Flag and certain songs, there are many other Customs and Courtesies that should be followed. When walking with senior members, the junior member should walk on the left side. Allowing the senior member to be on the right side is a form of respect. While in uniform, members should not put their hands in their pockets. Members should always act with professionalism, especially when in uniform, because they represent the Air Force and what it stands for. Show respect to the uniform and fellow members in it. The world is watching and the way members behave is how they perceive the military as a whole to be, so make a good impression!

Of course, the biggest need was helping to pay for the cost of the event, as lunch from Chick-Fil-A and movie tickets for 50 Honor Roll students doesn't come cheap.

"We paid for this to say thank you to the kids for all of their hard work," explained McCoy. "We all came together to promote a positive image for the kids. We wanted an example to show them that hard work pays off."

MAXWELL AIR FORCE BASE, Ala. – Since September 2017 more than 100 Reserve Citizen Airmen from the 908th Airlift Wing have spent almost two hours every Thursday prior to the wing's monthly Unit Training Assembly, handing out slices of pizza and talking with more than 170 students from T.S. Morris Elementary School in Montgomery, Ala.

The students earn the treat each month by having perfect attendance since the previous visit from wing members, led by Command Chief Master Sgt. Tina Carlson, senior enlisted member of the 908th.

"This is now the seventh month since Chief Carlson started doing this for the kids," said DeNitta Easterling, principal of T.S. Morris. "She has such an amazing heart, to take the time out of her day and come here and do this."

Thelma Smiley Morris Elementary School is a kindergarten through fifth grade school with an enrollment of 601 students in 41 classrooms.

“When I found out that Chief Carlson was doing this I thought, if she can find the time being a command chief to come do this, we as Airmen and NCOs under her need to find the time as well,” explained Staff Sgt. Briana Nelson, a medic with the 908th currently mentoring and leading future 908th members in the wing’s Development & Training Flight.

Nelson has seen the event grow each month since her first time coming in September.

“When I first came it was only about 35 students and four service members, explained Nelson. “Now, we have had up to 40 Airmen at once with more than 170 students.”

The growing participation is in part because the 908th members see the event as another way to serve the community.

“Taking the time to spend with children is important,” explained Senior Airman Janie Murray, a hydraulic specialist with the 908th Maintenance Squadron “My own son is 5 years old and I know how much it means to have those special visits, and to have people genuinely investing their time into you. Not because they have to, or because they get something out of it; but because they honestly care.”

The visits being something special is a view shared by both the students and the Airmen.

“This place is filled with so many amazing kids, I love coming to see them,” said Nelson.

Murray echoed Nelson’s comments by saying, “Getting to sit down and talk with some of the children was a great experience. You could see just how much it meant for them to have that time with us.”

Murray felt that the biggest thing she learned from being a part of this routine was, “just how much of an impact even something that seems so simple can have on other individuals, especially children. It was really wonderful to also see the higher levels of our leadership interacting with everyone as well. I feel it set a wonderful example of how no matter how busy our schedules get we should never forget about other parts of our community, most importantly the children.”

Easterling has seen the effects of the monthly event and believes they are nothing but positive.

MAXWELL AIR FORCE BASE, Ala. – The 908th Airlift Wing hosted the 22nd Air Force command team of Maj. Gen. Craig La Fave and Chief Master Sgt. Imelda Johnson during the wing's March Unit Training Assembly at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala.

La Fave arrived Friday, joining the 357th Airlift Squadron for a flight and then meeting with unit leaders at the wing's pre-UTA staff meeting.

Saturday morning started out fast and early, as La Fave and Col. Ken Ostrat, commander of the 908th participated in a mock physical fitness test with the wing's development and training flight, where La Fave scored an excellent rating.

La Fave and Johnson also met with local civic leaders, most of whom are 908th and 42nd Air Base

Wing Honorary Commanders who were taking part in a C-130 orientation flight.

The command team then took some time to discuss future deployments and aircraft status with members of the 908th Operation Group.

Next on the agenda was a tour of the 908th Maintenance Group's facilities including the ISO Dock and Half Bay hangers. After having discussions with Airmen from the MXG, the team moved over for some demonstrations at the prop shop and Non-Destructive Inspection sections, where wing members have been leading the way in finding and fixing deficiencies.

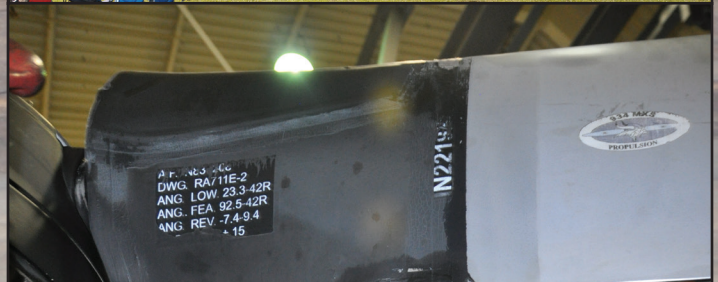
The adventure started during the wing's family day, May 6, 2017, where 17 civic leaders participated in an Honorary Commanders induction ceremony.

Those selected to be Honorary Commanders see the importance and potential in the program.

"Participating as an Honorary Commander for the 908th Airlift Wing is a humbling honor," said Jeremy Arthur, president and CEO of the Chamber of Commerce Association of Alabama. "To learn more about and witness what the men and women of the 908th do every day as leaders of our nation's military is an inspiration to me. the members got to see and experience what the Airmen in those organizations do on a daily basis.

"A few of the Honorary Commanders had visited the 908th previously for tours or change of command ceremonies, but they had not seen the working spaces of the Operations or Maintenance Groups," said Lobb. "One of them said 'they appreciated the unit even more after seeing where the behind the scenes work gets done,' in places like the Propeller and Engine Shop and the ISO Dock hangar."

Getting to see the Airmen working first hand gives Honorary Commanders the desire to share the experience with others in the community.

"The men and women who serve and train at Maxwell Air Force Base in the 908th deserve as much local support as possible," said David Woods, owner of WCOV. "My desire as an Honorary Commander with the 908th is to connect with these outstanding leaders and try to involve them locally to the best of my ability."

Next up for the honorary commanders was a civic leader tour out to Joint Base Charleston in October 2017.

"Several Honorary Commanders went on our Civic Leader Tour to Charleston in October," recalled Lobb. "They and the other guests on the tour were able to learn about the work of the 315th Airlift Wing, their strategic airlift mission, visit their huge aerial port operation among other things. Civic Leader Tours are a great opportunity to not only educate influential civilians about Air Force missions, but also to form long lasting relationships and support from members of our local community."

After a break for the holidays and cold winter weather, the program picked back up with the most recent event being an orientation flight in March 2018. Though this program is less than a year old, the foundation for it has been around for years and the current success of the program has made sure it will exist for years to come.

"It is my privilege to serve as an honorary commander with the 908th," said Mike Castanza, owner of Chappys Deli. "Montgomery is privileged to be intimate neighbors with this wing of C-130s and all its professional support staff. As a local business man with Chappys Deli I appreciate their tireless effort to be 'always ready' to support and defend our country. God bless the 908th family."

"The best part for the kids is the interaction with all the Airmen," said Easterling. "Doing this has greatly improved attendance and attitudes."

Wing App for Mobile Devices

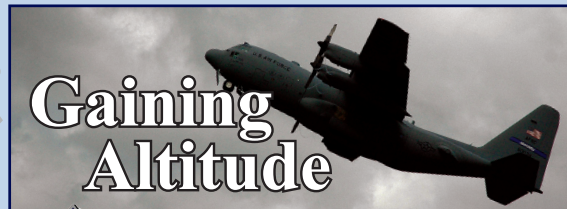
